## Mrs. Kublin's and Mrs. Oppenheim's Class Handbook:

## Team Teaching

If you have older children, this is a similar model to what our 4th and 5th grade teachers use. Mrs. Oppenheim will be teaching Math and Science, while Mrs. Kublin teaches Social Studies and Reading. For about three weeks at a time, students will be participating in a unit of Science with Mrs. Oppenheim and then rotate for three weeks of Social Studies with Mrs. Kublin. All other subjects and activities (including morning routines, writing, quiet reading, snack, and dismissal) will take place in your child's homeroom.

## Class News

Our classroom website will be up-dated on a weekly basis, Sunday night.

## On the Web

Our class has a home on the Internet! We have a classroom web-page on which Mrs. Kublin and Mrs. Oppenheim will display classroom news and student pictures. Parents can visit the web-page to view weekly spelling words, homework schedule, obtain a copy of math homework, get familiar with the thirdgrade curriculum, and keep up-to-date on classroom events. Our site is located at http://kublinoppenheim.weebly.com/.

## Cooperative Learning and Independent Work

As a team, we wholeheartedly believe in cooperative learning in the classroom. We will place our students in flexible groupings, so that they may learn from each other. Research has shown that students do better when they are allowed to discuss and defend their ideas as they learn. Working in small groups also helps students learn valuable social skills that they will need throughout life. We've had great success with this technique in recent years and students really enjoy the opportunity to work with each other. In other words, students will have many opportunities to work in cooperative groups during the day. They are also expected to work quietly when completing independent work.

## Attendance \& Illnesses

Regular school attendance is critical to the learning process. Our school day officially starts at 8:30 a.m. When your child is absent or tardy, he or she misses valuable instructional time. While it is important to be in school as much as possible, it is necessary to keep your child home if he or she is sick. Currently, it is policy that a child must be free of fever for 24 hours before returning to school. Thank you for understanding. If students miss school days for vacations, I will ask that they read and fill out a journal about their trip for writing practice. Any important work missed due to vacation will be given to students at the time of their return. Students will be given the same number of days they were absent to turn in missed assignments for credit (e.g. if your child is absent Tuesday and Wednesday, he or she would have until Friday to submit assignments).

## Chaperoning our Field Trips

Please remember that chaperones must fill out a CORI form in the Main Office and a background check will be conducted before they may work in the school. CORI checks expire after three years, so it is important to check with the office to make sure your form is up-to-date. I will be looking for interested parents and guardians to join us on some of our exciting field trips this year. If you are interested in chaperoning, I suggest that you ensure your CORI is on file as soon as possible (our trip to Plimoth Plantation seems to arrive quickly!). As the dates for these events approach, I will send home notices to ask for volunteers. The same applies for special projects or activities that require additional adult supervision or assistance.

## Afternoon Snacks \& Water Consumption

This year our lunch is at 11:25 a.m., so we will be having our snack in the afternoon after specials around 2:00. We permit our students to bring a water bottle to school to keep on their desks during the day. In order for students to keep a drink on their desk, the bottle must have a secure lid.

## Homework

We believe that homework is necessary for practicing skills that have been learned, for enriching the classroom experience, and to teach students how to manage his or her time, so they are prepared for homework in the upper grades. On the other hand, I don't believe in overloading students will busywork! Since assigned homework is integral to classroom success, students will be accountable for completing homework in a timely fashion. You will read about the associated incentive in the below section on our Behavior Management System. Students will be given one "oops" for each quarter of the school year. After forgetting to submit one homework assignments, students will be expected to complete missing work during our free choice time (Friday afternoon - 30 minutes) and will miss our homework party at the end of the quarter.

In addition to reading, third graders are expected to complete up to 30 minutes (homework time formula: grade $\times 10$ minutes so $3 \times 10=30$ minutes) of homework each school night. It is my expectation that students will read at least 15 minutes at home daily. Students will be given a Weekly Reading Log at the start of each week. They will indicate the title and number of minutes read. A parent or guardian is asked to initial as well. Other homework assignments may include: math review, spelling assignments, comprehension passages, writing prompts, book reports, studying for quizzes/tests using a teacher prepared study guide, and standardized test practice. In order to help students get their homework assignments done, students have been given an agenda and a homework folder. They will write their assignments in their planner each day and place any important papers in the folder. Homework assignments can also be found on our web-site http://kublinoppenheim.weebly.com/homework-schedule.html.

## Spelling Groups

Each week, students will receive a new list of spelling words from his or her spelling teacher. Students are to complete one spelling choice activity each night (see spelling choices worksheet). Spelling is assessed and given its own grade on report cards (in addition to Literature Comprehension, Written
Communication, Math, Science, Social Studies). If you misplace your spelling words they can be found on our web-site http://kublinoppenheim.weebly.com/spelling.html

Please note that
Third-graders are given letter grades ( A, B, C, D, and F) on their report cards at Page Hilltop.

## Behavior Checklists

Checklists will be distributed at the start of each week reflecting behavior from the previous week. Each student that exhibits all of the goal behaviors will earn a prize from the treasure chest. In addition to following the classroom rules and expectations as discussed in class, the checklist also reflects homework completion.

## Daily Math Practice

In my experience, students cannot move on to higher level reasoning in mathematics until he or she masters his or her basic math facts. You can help your child prepare by studying with flashcards or having them spend some time working with online flashcards at www.mathfactcafe.com.

Timed Facts Tests: Every Friday (or last day of the week) students will take a facts test. Each student will start with addition, followed by subtraction, and then proceed to multiplication. Each student will progress to a new facts test after receiving $95 \%$ or better (the test must be $100 \%$ completed). The goal for grade 3 is to complete facts through $9 \times 9$ by the end of the year. These scores do not influence your child's math grades.

## State Frameworks Grade 3-4

Know multiplication facts through $12 \times 12$ and related division facts. Use these facts to solve related multiplication problems and compute related problems, e.g., $3 \times 5$ is related to $30 \times 50,300 \times 5$, and $30 \times 500$.
